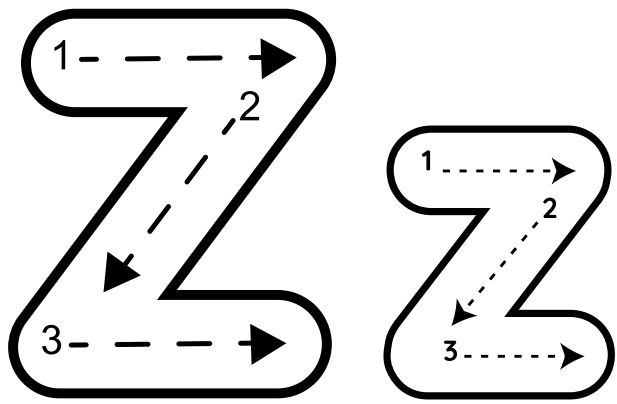


# is for Yellow Birch

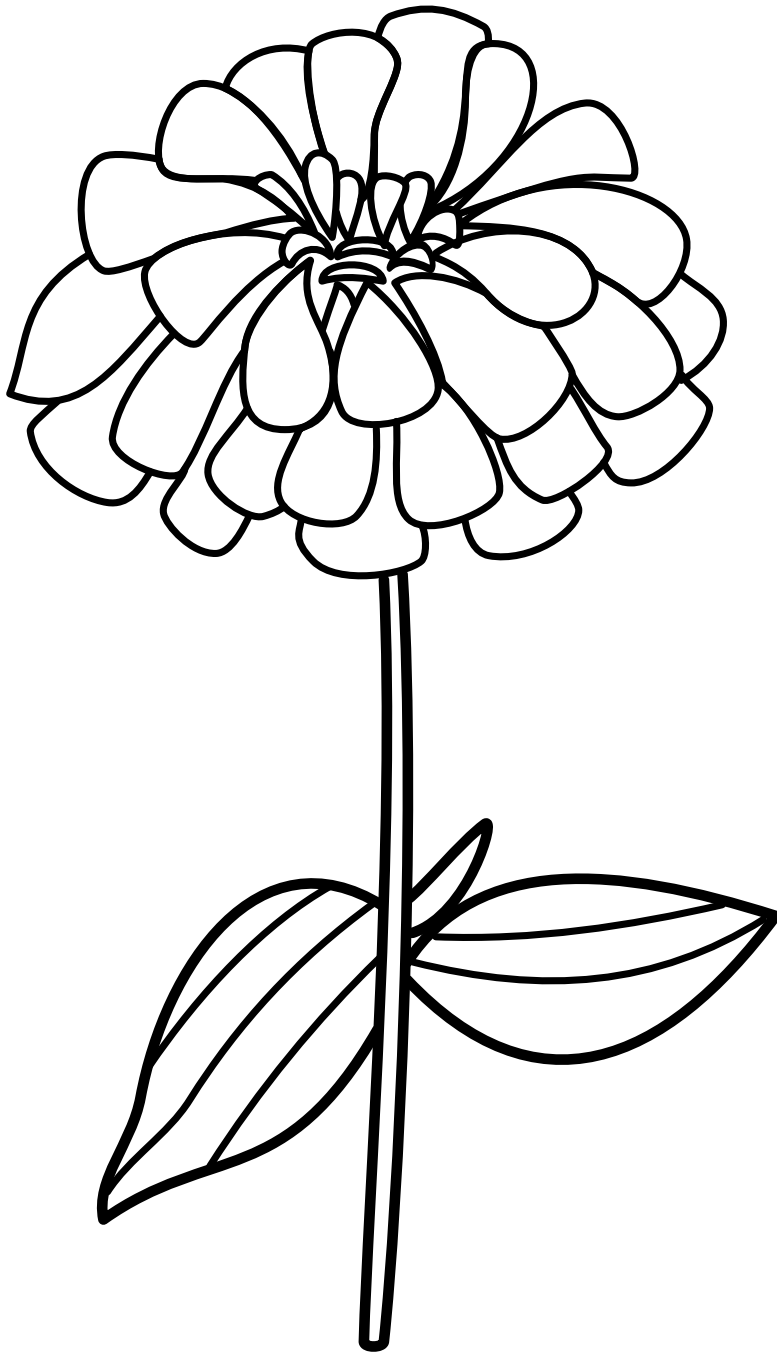
Fun Fact: The Yellow Birch got its name because of the yellow color of the bark and fall leaves.
